PRIMOŽ LAMPIČ

Grupa Junij /The June Group/ was founded by a group of artists who completed their studies at the Ljubljana Academy of Fine Art around 1970. These artists shared common views of society, art, and creativity, and their intention was to facilitate a breakthrough on the Slovenian art scene. After 1976 the group became international and the individual artists, who were more than pleased by the group's activities, willingly donated their work, thus laying the foundations for the emergence of the Junij' International Art Collection (JIAC). It was officially founded in 1980. In 1996 the 'Junij' Society bequeathed the collection to the Ljubljana Museum of Architecture and Design, where it has been kept ever since.

The collection consists of 1,300 works by more than 140 artists from 30 countries (30 artists are from Slovenia). It features photographs, mixed media, graphic prints, drawings, caricatures, and even a few paintings and sculptures. The collection was set up mostly by the members of 'Grupa Junij' (Enver Kaljanac, Tone Demšar, Ratimir Pušelja), particularly Stane Jagodič. However, some of the artists were proposed by colleagues from abroad: Lorenzo Merlo, Myricae Merlo, Joan Fontcuberta, Floris M. Neusüss, Sue Davies, Alberto Piovani, and several others.

The JIAC is the result of efforts by dedicated individuals in an exceptional period of time when the solidarity among artists was strong and international, and when the art market was still slightly dazed by conceptual actions. Today such a project would be much more difficult or even impossible to implement.

Grupa Junij: Principles of artistic self-affirmation

'Grupa Junij' adopted principles that follow the example of the successors of historical avant-gardes and created a constructive synthesis of different styles and trends. The main idea embraced by the group was the autonomy of art as such, freed of any political, academic, and aesthetic demands for pure styles and genres. During the period, in which modernist painting and sculpture prevailed, the members of 'Grupa Junii' resorted to reproducible media, particularly the innovative use of photography, although there was a broad range of different forms of expression and media. Because of their diversity, the creative practices of the group cannot be generalised, however the common characteristic of a broad range of different artists gathered in 'Grupa Junij' is connected with figuralism, narrative art, and a direct expression of a message. The group was highly sensitive to the socio-political events of that time, which it translated into a highly original artistic language without any reservations. Their works were steeped in the spirit of the 1970s and early 1980s, as well as topics such as ecology, global demography and the related side effects of accelerated urbanisation, alienation, militancy, repression by state institutions, and growing consumerism. These topics are still relevant today both in civil society and art. Instead of explicit content, what characterised the work of artists belonging to 'Grupa Junij' was metaphor and poetry expressed in different forms particularly connected with photography as an autonomous medium or a tool for recording ephemeral actions. The exhibition therefore focuses on the use of photography, which is probably the most distinguishing segment of the group's legacy.



Junij Group 1970 - 1985

Stane Jagodič was the initiator and head of Junij Group / Grupa Junij (the founding members were all born in June) for many years. At the beginning the Group advocated the expressionism, later, they openly supported their attitude to committed satirical drawing – caricature and creative photography with science-fictional and surrealistic touch. They equally emphasized the aspects of constructivism in the direction of ideal synthesis between organic and inorganic forms, which Jagodič concisely described in a short manifesto Junij.

International Junij Art Collection 1985

The International Junij Art Collection, which was founded on the basis of the works of art, donated by many co-operators and exhibitors of the Junij Group, was Jagodič's idea. He himself collected all the works and founded the Collection in 1985. It comprises about 1000 works of art with emphasis on photographic medium, photomontage, collage, graphic art, caricature, painting and sculpture donated by approx. 140 authors. It was first presented in the Jakopič Gallery in Ljubljana, in 1985. Among the donators there were worldly known visual artists. In 1988, the professional co-operator of Junij Group and art critic Dr Lev Menaše made a selection of photographs out of the photographic stock in the Collection. And this selection was exhibited in the Yugoslav Cultural Center in Paris on the initiative of the photographer Mirko Lovrić from Belgrade. This exhibition was set up in the framework of the international biennial 'Mois de la photo a Paris' (1988). It took part in the competition entitled 'Aspects of Creative European Photography' 1968-1988, and was awarded the first prize. There were 34 Paris museums and galleries competing to win the first prize.

The commission of selection of art works were: Agnes de Gouvion Saint-Cyr, Alain Dister, Jean-Claude Lemagny, Guy Mandery and Jean-Luc Monterosso (commissioner of the 'Mois de la photo a Paris' 1988). The president of the jury was a film actress Charlotte Rampling and members: Maria Morris Hambourg (USA), Jean-Christophe Averty, Claude Bedat and Francois Boisrond (France). This award confirmed once again the committed and research-based multimedia activity of the Junij Group in the field of the worldwide creative photography. In 1996, the Collection was donated to the **Museum of Architecture and Design in Ljubljana** directed by the art historian Dr Peter Krečič. Its guard and curator is the art historian Dr Primož Lampič, employed in that institution.

Words from the visual art critic, theorist Dr Aaron Scharf

"The too early maturity of the Junij Group amazes me again and again. It is unique! In the totality of its activities I discern imagination liberated by this wonderful union of artists, culturally so different, but united by humour, irony, playful exuberance. The Junij Group as an international comrades association appears to me as a creative body in which the whole is considerably bigger than the sum of individual parts. Is there a group like that anywhere? The singular use of photography in the group showed itself so impetuosly and differently as never before, perhaps with the exception of Surrealists. The group deserves to be internationally better known than it is, and (poetically speaking) I applaud this sea of stars lighting the horizon of aesthetics".
